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## THE LANGUAGE OF LGBTQ+ MINORITY STRESS EXPERIENCES ON SOCIAL MEDIA

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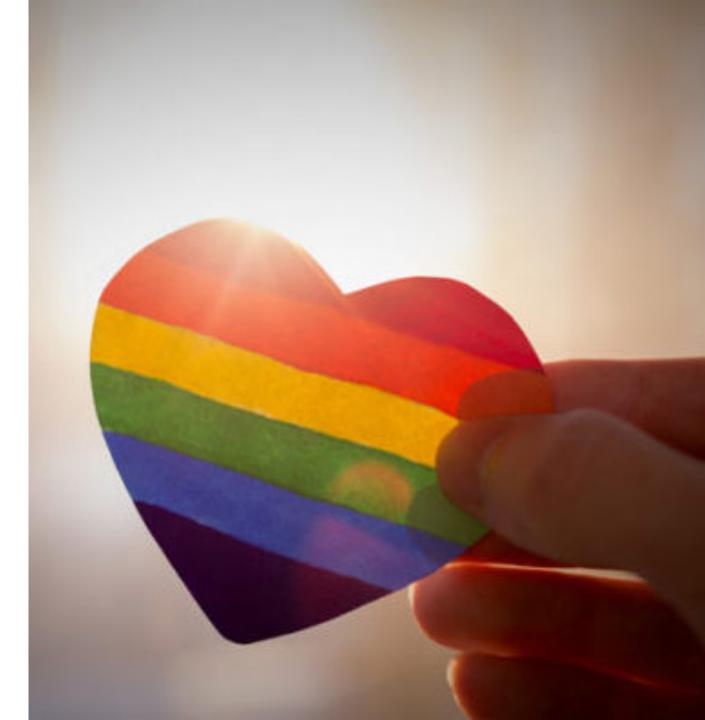
The data was anonymized, and only paraphrased quotes of social media data are used. Multiple coauthors hold different LGBTQ+ identities, enabling us to incorporate the sensitivity and contextualize our findings in the light of our lived experiences



LGBTQ+ is an acronym used to refer to individuals who use these sexual or gender labels as personally meaningful for them.

# MENTAL HEALTH OF LGBTQ+ INDIVIDUALS

- 3 times more likely than others to experience a mental health condition.
- 2.5 times more likely to experience depression.
- 3 times more likely to report suicidality and attempted suicide.



#### LGBTQ+ MINORITY STRESS

- Stigma, prejudice, and discrimination create hostile and stressful social environment
- Minority Stress Theory (proposed by Ilan H. Meyer in 1995)

Minority stress theory proposes that LGBTQ+ mental health disparities can be explained largely by stressors induced by a hostile, homophobic, and transphobic culture, which often leads to harassment, mistreatment, and victimization. This may ultimately impact access to care.

#### **SOCIAL MEDIA**

- Widespread prevalence of social media use among LGBTQ+
- Stigma, self-disclosure, and support-seeking on social media
- Anonymity, Audience, and Senseof-Belonging in Community

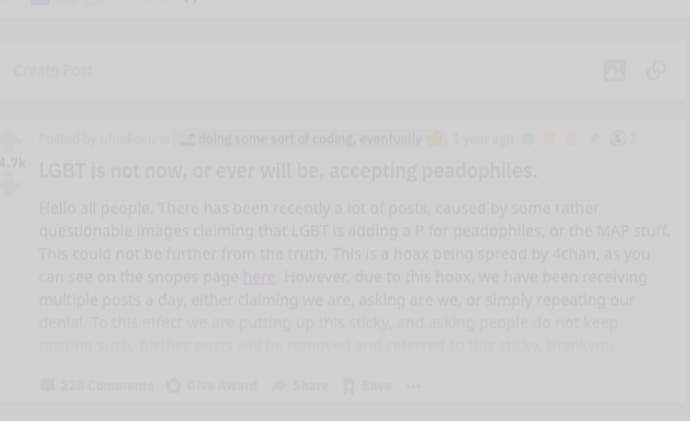


#### **OUR WORK**

... a codebook to identify minority stressors in social media per Meyer's minority stress theory.

... a machine learning classifier to identify social media posts on minority stress

... a lexicon of social media language markers contextualized in minority stress theory

A safe space for GSRM (Gender, Sexual, and Romantic Minority) folk to discuss their lives, issues, interests, and passions. LGBT is still a popular term used to discuss gender and sexual minorities, but all GSRM are welcome beyond lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people who consent to participate in a safe space.



#### DATA AND STUDY

- 12,645 posts on r/lgbt subreddit
  - January 2016 to May 2018
- Codebook on minority stress experiences on social media
  - 350 randomly sampled posts were qualitatively inspected
- Machine learning classifier on minority stress experiences on social media
  - Used to classify the entire sample of data
- Linguistic Cues associated with the language of minority stress

#### **CODEBOOK: ANNOTATION APPROACH**

Drawn from Meyer's Minority Stress Theory:

- Difference in time and context
- Differences in identity
- Differences in data and medium of communication

**Prejudice Events** 

Perceived Stigma

Internalized LGBTphobia

#### PREJUDICE EVENTS

Explicit actions of rejection toward an individual related to their LGBTQ+ identity.

- Verbal and Physical Violence
- Legal Discrimination
- Anxiety / stress about discriminatory political powers

#### PERCEIVED STIGMA

Internalized fears and anxiety of expected rejection from others

- Individuals constantly monitoring their behavior: how one dresses, speaks, walks, and talks in contrast to expected social norms.
- Lying to cover up identity
- Thinking others do not or will not "accept" them
- Feelings of not "fitting in"

#### INTERNALIZED LGBT-PHOBIA

Internalization of negative societal attitudes and negative feelings that come from self about self.

- Self-hate for being a part of the LGBTQ+ community.
- Feelings of negativity rooted from LGBTQ+ identity.
- Feelings of isolation or of ending up alone.
- Hate/distaste for others within LGBTQ+ community

#### **OBSERVATIONS**

- We see a wide range of minority stressors
- Some minority stressors are perpetuated by some subsets of the LGBTQ+ population to other subsets,
- Sense of belonging within the community

# Machine Learning Classifier

#### MACHINE LEARNING FEATURES

- Latent Semantics (Word Embeddings)
- Psycholinguistic Attributes (LIWC)
- Hate Lexicon
- Open Vocabulary (*n*-grams)
- Sentiment
- Mental Health Concerns (DASS: Depression, Anxiety, Stress, and Suicidal Ideation)

#### MACHINE LEARNING PERFORMANCE

#### ANALYZING LANGUAGE CUES

- Use Minority Stress Classifier to infer the presence of minority stress in the entire dataset
- Obtain discriminating keywords of presence / absence of minority stress expressions using SAGE<sup>1</sup>

#### LINGUISTIC CUES: MINORITY STRESS

Keywords related to sharing and disclosing to those who are close to the discloser (e.g., tell mom, telling people, started talking)

"I'm a coward to be unable to tell my mom to her face that I'm gay."

#### LINGUISTIC CUES: MINORITY STRESS

Keywords that express self-experiences and life events (e.g., started feeling, days later, etc.)

"started feeling these issues when I was 16 or 17, and because of my parents, I was like, "No I won't do this", and shoved them back down again."

#### LINGUISTIC CUES: NO MINORITY STRESS

Keywords relating to friendliness and sense of community (e.g., *lgbtq community, lgbt friendly,* etc.)

"I thank the LGBTQ+ community for being together, through friends and social media."

#### ERROR ANALYSIS OF MINORITY STRESS CLASSIFIER

| Precision | Recall | AUC  |
|-----------|--------|------|
| 0.75      | 0.74   | 0.80 |

- Identify similar posts but contrasting outcomes on minority stress expressions
- Compare and contrast the similar posts

#### ERROR ANALYSIS: FALSE POSITIVES

- Past Experiences
- Seeking Relationship Advices

"My best friend is a trans man who has been constantly abused [..] is now taking anxiety medication and have managed to survive thus far. Does someone know of any safe spaces for trans men who are recovering from abuse or from suicide?"

#### ERROR ANALYSIS: FALSE NEGATIVES

- Asking Question(s)
- Lack of context and non-explicit description of self-experience
- Typos and variants of slangs

Guys! I'm in need of a chest binder. I'm in extreme dysphoria that badly affects my daily life.

### **Discussion**

#### **ETHICS**

- These automated approaches may reinforce stressors such as prejudice and stigma.
- Minority stress classifier could be misused by bad-actors.
- An individual may not be willing to have their minority stress be identified.
- Ethical complexity associated with using such classifier in nonanonymized platforms (Twitter, Facebook).

#### ETHICAL IMPLICATIONS

 An opt-in approach, where members of an online community are given the choice whether or not to participate in a mental health intervention (that uses their data).

It is only meant to complement and assist human intervention.

 Any decision and interventions using our classification approach require careful and in-depth supplemental ethical analysis.

#### **IMPLICATIONS**

Social Media Interventions for LGBTQ+ individuals:

- Moderation and Support Matching Efforts
- Therapeutic Efforts (e.g., Journaling tools)

#### **IMPLICATIONS**

Public Health Implications:

- Clinical and Therapeutic Practice
- Minority Stress Research
